	o Defined quorum – Original quorum was 8 members of the 15 active members – new quorum to consider – a minimum
	of 3 members or more present can make a motion. The Council itself cannot be less than 3 active members. Open meeting law – New open meeting law, video conferencing could occur essentially in any location under extraordinary circumstances. However, the Council must create a policy, vote on said policy and post on the DOH OMH-HDP MHC/HE Council webpage. • The Council in 2023. • Freddy Molano brought up to make sure all documents are consistent to the new name; Helen asked Wilma when the official name of the Council was changed. Wilma stated that the name of the Office of Minority Health and Health Disparities Prevention was changed to the Office of Health Equity officially by July of 2022. (Last year, SB S.9185/ AB A.9764 was signed 8/17/2022 to amend the name of the Office of Minority Health and Health Disparities Prevention to the Office of Health Equity). Due to this legislation be the name of the Council should reflect the new name which was passes by both houses and approved by the Governor as historical documentation. • Review of the bylaws • The Vice-chair will support the chair with the general supervision of the Council. Council Member Updates	 Guillermo Chacon – In conjunction with the Spanish Federation along with many community-based organizations, a statewide process to develop with the compliment of the city, a city and state Hispanic Latinx Health Action Agenda. One of his key points to report to the council members was that he replicated what was done for the city, which was done with consultation, workgroups by population for the statewide agenda a week before the general election in which we wish the best to all the candidates. He hosted a 3-hour national Hispanic Latinx Help Leadership Institute in Puerto Rico. Next steps include gathering the network in Washington DC in March 2024 to update the federal agenda. The Latino Commission has partnered with New York City Department of Health and Mental Hygiene to address the monkeypox crisis. The Oasis Community Center Facility gave over 500 vaccination and was featured in the official press release of the Department of Health recognizing several partners. Daniel Carrion –Has a grant funded by NASA to learn of the impact of climate change in communities of color that are disproportionately impacted by the impacts of climate change in the United States. The idea behind the grant is to identify areas of New York state that experience localized temperature disparities, meaning areas that on average hotter than their neighbors, develop a mapping tool that people can identify those locations and areas where they can potentially target energy efficiency upgrades for people. Daniel is teaching a practicum at the Yale School of Public Health leveraged to support NGO and CBO interests in the space of climate and health equity with the goal of partnering with a CBO regarding climate preparedness and public housing in New York City. Louis (Freddy) Molano – Continues to work with the city on vaccine efforts through 12/30/22. He understands there are people reluctant to get the second dose of the vaccine. Freddy encourages everyone to get vaccinated. Freddy is also embark

	 Helen Arteaga-Landaverde (Presiding Chair) – It has been very busy at Elmhurst Hospital this winter with RSV, with the children and pediatric patients, COVID and the flu. The hospital is focusing on educating the staff and the communities for them to get tested for COVID and get their vaccines. Helen thanks the Council members for their efforts in health literacy, climate change and women included in a Prep Study.

Johanne Morne offered a few things for the next meeting agenda: As of June 2023, Article 28, facilitates will be responsible when submitting a certificate of need for the purpose of environmental change or construction to conduct a health equity assessment. The New York State Prevention Agenda may be helpful with some of the examples which are aligned with the ones that has been shared in relating to sexual health and other areas. There are health equity goals in that, and Johanne believes that the advisement based on the Council's background and experience would be very helpful to continue to move forward with equity at the center. Wilma Alvarado-Little, mention that she and Johanne will work as a team on the New York State Prevention Agenda to include at the next Council meeting.
