


More New Yorkers Agree That Movies Rated G, PG, and PG-13 Should Not Show Actors Smoking

Research suggests that seeing smoking in movies is associated with more positive attitudes toward smoking and smoking initiation among youth. From 2003 to 2007, an increasing percentage of New Yorkers agreed that movies rated G, PG, and PG-13, should not show actors smoking.

- In 2007, 77% of smokers agreed that actors should not smoke in movies rated G, PG, and PG-13, up from 55% in 2003 a 40% increase.
- In 2007, 82% of non-smokers agreed that actors should not smoke in movies rated G, PG, and PG-13, a 15% increase from the rate of 72% in 2003.
- New York figures are similar to that seen nationally.
