Key Points from NYS Vehicle and Traffic Law

Child Passenger Safety

- Children under the age of eight must be in a federally-approved child restraint system.
- A vehicle's seat belts are not defined as child restraint systems under the law, as they are not designed for children.
- Depending on a child's size, the restraint system may be an infant-only, convertible, combination, all-in-one, or booster seat used with a lap and shoulder belt.
- All children must use a rear-facing car seat until they are two years old or reach the highest weight or height limit allowed by the car seat manufacturer. For babies that outgrow their infant-only car seat, it is recommended that a convertible or all-in-one seat be used in the rear-facing position until they outgrow the highest weight or height limit for the rear-facing position.
- Children over the age of two who have outgrown the highest weight or height limit for the rear-facing position must remain in an appropriate child restraint system that meets the recommendations of the seat's manufacturer until their eighth birthday.
- If the child is eight years old and is under 4'9" tall or weighs less than 100 pounds, continued use of a child restraint system is recommended.

Seat Belt Use for Drivers and Passengers

- All drivers and passengers eight years of age or older must be properly restrained by a seat belt.
- The driver must make sure that each passenger under the age of sixteen years old is properly restrained by a seat belt or appropriate child restraint system.
